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What we did in the April regional engagement meetings?

- 4. We have been conducting many HLMs with members
- 5. We launched the provision and prioritisation survey
- 6. We are developing a plan for each region that addresses both the needs and the gaps
- 7. NOW we are mapping global, regional and national priorities







Current Executive Summary: Key messages

Ongoing policies and programmes

Patient safety, people-centred care and competency development are the main areas of activity for the member organisations, but remain underdeveloped.

IPE and IPC

There is a need for recognition of pharmacists by other healthcare professions – this is linked to interprofessional education and collaborative practice.

Metrics and intelligence

Pharmacy intelligence is lacking – this needs building to support addressing gaps in education and training.

CPD and competency development

- Variance in delivering CPD strategy across the globe and a plurality of CPD provision.
- Workplace training and professional portfolios are not common; leads to opportunities to develop programmes to support this.
- Competency-based education needs further development (including early career and advanced/specialist); scope of practice is not always defined
 - Opportunity to provide <u>early years foundation training</u> focusing on people-centred care.
 - Training gaps, for example consumer healthcare education programmes on smoking cessation.
- Pharmacy technicians are a part of the workforce worth considering for workforce development (*eg. consumer healthcare*); significant training gap in the provision market.
- Advanced and specialist training is a clear need (gap) worldwide. "FIP Masterclass" concept (in clinical topics or clinical leadership, etc).
















Regions prioritizing

DG15 People centred care





July to September-

Collation of all we have done since Jan 2020, map and track (visualise) the key outputs and responses every 100 days. FIP Team initiating this work now.

September-

Present to Council and there we will gather priorities per MO / nations for preparedness

Also, across all sections / SIGs and constituencies

October to December-

Compile the priorities

Publish the collation of work / 100 days and priorities

This will be submitted to WHO in line with their guidelines in November or December (depending on their plans to include non-state actors),

or as standalone plan for the profession.

This will inform the subsequent work for 2022.







FIP Data and Intelligence Meeting 05 July 2021

Key messages

- This was the third meeting of the Data and Intelligence Commission meeting with strong attendance from across regions and FIP boards and forums.
- A one pager on what success will look like for the GPO in the short and long term was approved by the Commission. These recommendations will be passed onto the GPO Steering Group for consideration.
- The commission were updated about FIP plans for global preparedness for the next pandemic.
- Advocacy, marketing and communications were discussed in depth in break out rooms. A set of recommendations for these areas will be developed by the Commission.
- The Development Goal 12 event will be held on 24 September. Members of the Commission were asked to contribute ideas for the event as the focus is pharmacy intelligence.







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WHO and FIP Collaboration on biowaivers

- 1. The ongoing work on biowaivers, in collaboration with WHO, is of huge importance to the ONE FIP agenda.
- 2. The work links closely with the FIP vision for a world where everyone benefits from access to safe and effective medicines and pharmaceutical care and ensures the place of pharmaceutical science is core to the FIP vision.
- 3. Given the focus on 2022 will be on safety, it is imperative for FIP to continue and consolidate this work in the coming months and use THIS programme as a BPS led ONE-FIP project.
- 4. Focusing on the South Americas in the latter half of 2021, we can develop a <u>regional to global</u> <u>approach</u> This can then form a pathfinder approach across the other priority regions in 2022 (using learnings from UNITWIN) that we can roll out in 2022.
- 5. Building collaborations and relationships across our partners in South America, we can develop a regional roadmap for the development and access to biowaivers.





WHO and FIP Collaboration on biowaivers



Latin America

- 33 different countries
- ~660 million people

Regulatory challenge:

- ~50% of Latin American countries lack defined bioequivalence standards
- in countries were bioequivalence studies are considered, acceptance of BCS-based biowaiver requirements is heterogenous.

FIP Latin America Biowaiver Project (FIPLABP):

➤ To advocate for broader implementation of BCS-based biowaivers in the region by facilitating educational outreach and workforce development activities.
